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A Genetic Phenomenological Perspective of Historical Philosophy: Landgrebe's Intellectual Connection with Husserl and Dilthey

Abstract: As a disciple of Husserl and the main compiler of his manuscripts, Landgrebe played an important role in highlighting the genetic phenomenology and the historical phenomenology as the core theories of Husserl in his late years. Meanwhile, by incorporating Dilthey's analysis on the historical world in the context of the transcendental phenomenology and Heidegger's fundamental ontology, Landgrebe not only elucidated the potential foundational significance of phenomenology to the mental science, but also made an important exploration into linking transcendental phenomenology to fundamental ontology.
